More About Towns

A town, like a city or village, is a local general purpose unit of government. "A town is a body corporate and politic, with those powers granted by law." Sec. 60.01(1). A town may sue and be sued, acquire and dispose of real and personal property for public uses, and enter into contracts necessary for the exercise of its powers. Sec. 60.01(2). A town has only those powers that are conferred by statute or may be necessarily implied from the statute. Towns, unlike cities and villages, do not have constitutional home rule powers. Town officers have only those

powers conferred upon them by statute.

A town is sometimes referred to as a quasi-municipal corporation, to distinguish it from a city or village. In a similar fashion, a town, even though it is a "body corporate and politic," is sometimes referred to as "unincorporated" to distinguish it from the "incorporated" local general purpose units of government — cities and villages. Another term, which may cause some confusion, is "township". The township in Wisconsin

Type of Voting Machine Used by Town of West Bend

The Town of West Bend changed from punch card ballots to optical scanning for ballots with the AccuVote Mark Sense Voting system on September 13, 1994 for the Primary Election. This machine is programmed for each specific election with a memory card. Upon completion of filling in your ballot with a black marker type pen (filling in the circle next to the name of candidate) you then deposit it into the machine that automatically counts this ballot. If you have made an error as to fill-

ing in the ballot correctly, the machine will kick it back out. Example: In the fall Primary you could not cross over. If you did the machine would not accept the ballot. If you have a "spoiled ballot" you may ask the poll worker for another ballot. The poll workers are not only there to hand out ballots, they will instruct you as to how to fill the ballot out. Anyone experiencing problems with procedure should definitely ask for help.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Snow season has arrived and a little early this year. Despite maintenance work that is done on the trucks during the off season to prepare them for the snow season, the snowplow trucks (especially the older one) have a tendency to break down, naturally during the time they are being used and needed. These wonderful orange trucks don't just go up and down the roads and clear the roads, they cause numerous headaches for the full time employees in the Department of Public Works. The Town of West Bend does not employ

mechanics to specifically work on vehicles when broken down as some other municipalities and the County do. John Smith and Bill Roggenbach do the majority of repair work on these vehicles, most of which needs to be done immediately so the trucks can be back on the roads.

During a recent snow the 1987 truck blew a hydraulic line, which entails the entire hydraulic system for the truck. The Town Chairman went into the shop to find John and Bill in their coveralls, under the

snow and oil covered truck, faces dirty, clothes completely covered in oil, working fast and furiously to get this truck back on the road. When a truck goes down it takes at least one driver off the road if not two. There was no request to get someone into repair this vehicle even when the Town Chairman asked if they wanted to call someone. The Department of Public Works does not get the credit due it at times. The men work hard on many items that are not visible to the public.

POLL WORKERS PRAISED FOR EFFICIENT PROCESS OF ELECTORS AT THE NOVEMBER 7, 2000 ELECTION.

Pearl Mueller, Deputy Clerk for Elections, and the poll workers received many compliments on how well voting proceeded. Electors waited and completed voting, for the most part, within five to ten minutes. It was reported some towns had a waiting time of one hour or more.

Even though this term often appears, even on state forms, the correct term for the local general purpose governmental subdivision is "town".
